Two cZK m_Y\La ky agents were exceptionally able and influential men. Master Nicholas Stoket, trained in law, first comes to notice in his capacity as h\Y`V]g\cdky negotiator in 1382 when he was dispatched to Rome to represent Wykeham at his triennial visit to the papal curia. Six years later he served as an envoy to Prussia, and between 1389 and 1394 was an occasional commissioner in appeals from the Court of Chivalry and Court of Admiralty. But he also seems to have worked tirelessly as the bishop of Winchesterky Wyf_, and not least in 1393, the only year for which
